Course Aims: Getting familiar with folk crafts and their use in preschool education. How to create handmade products and do folk craft out of crops from our surroundings.
Learning Outcomes: By the end of the semester students will be familiar with the concept of folk crafts. They will also know about the creation of these handmade products and how they may be used in education of little children. They will also be able to tell the difference between various sorts of folk crafts and their characteristics. They will be able to use these crafts in games and education in preschool institutions.
Syllabus: <i>Theory</i> Field, basic terms and sources of ethnology. The concept of folk crafts. Traditional crafts and techniques. Folk art. Folk crafts in making toys. Source and origin of materials for handmade products. The role of domestic, local surrounding in finding materials for handmade products. Materials for folk toys: crops, pumpkin, walnuts, wool, cotton, wood, string, seeds of different plants and fruits. The role of handcraft in creative work. Natural materials and plastic. The process of creation, inheritance, transfer and varying.
<i>Practice</i> In practical classes students learn about examples of the above mentioned handcrafts. They prepare a presentation about some sorts of folk handcrafts. They also collect these handcraft products during their fieldwork. Finding old photos with old handmade toys. They try to make handcraft products by themselves, too.
