<p>Course Aims:</p> <p>Obtainment of new and deepening of acquired knowledge about different aspects (social, political, economic, cultural, etc.) of the history of Europe and the world in the second half of the long nineteenth century (1848-1914). Development of critical thinking and a multi-perspective approach in independent interpretation of results of scientific research on political, social, economic, and cultural aspects.</p>
<p>Learning Outcomes:</p> <p>The ability to independently identify, describe and interpret the most important events, phenomena, problems, and processes from the history of Europe and the world in the long nineteenth century in accordance with the results of modern historiographical research.</p>
<p>Syllabus:</p> <p><i>Theory</i></p> <p>Presentations on the historical prerequisites, context, subjects, factors, and most important events significant for the history of Europe and the world in the second part of the long 19th century - the Age of Liberal Capitalism (c. 1850 – c. 1870) and the Age of Imperialism (c. 1870 – c. 1918). These include: problems of periodization of the mentioned era and methodological assumptions for its study, biographical approach to the problem, societies, art, and science in the mentioned era. Course includes current events and processes: the unification of Germany and Italy, the Great Eastern Crisis, the Berlin Congress and the European order created from it, the system of imperialist alliances, the emergence of the bloc division of Europe, the European crisis in the first decade of the 20th century and the collapse of the system created after the Berlin Congress. Society and everyday life of Europe in the mentioned period, social and political ideologies of the 19th century (liberalism, conservatism, national ideologies, socialism...), revolution in natural sciences, technical and technological transformation of production.</p> <p><i>Practice</i></p> <p>Reading of historical sources and literature and critical reflection on them, presentation of students' homework.</p>
