<p>Course Aims:</p> <p>Introducing students to the most important historical phenomena, events and processes in the social history of the Ottoman Empire. Developing critical thinking and a multi-perspective approach in independently interpreting the results of scientific research. Acquaintance with relevant literature, historical sources, peculiarities of the archival and paleographic-diplomatic approach to the study of Ottoman history.</p>
<p>Learning Outcomes:</p> <p>The ability to independently describe and interpret the most important historical phenomena, events, and processes based on the results of modern scientific research and critical analysis of historical sources and literature.</p>
<p>Syllabus:</p> <p><i>Theory</i></p> <p>The Ottoman state and society, the Ottoman state system, the organization of ulema and kalemīye classes, the importance of the gazi ideology and the center-periphery relationship in the Ottoman society. The principle of religious tolerance and the millet system, the organization of guilds, the structure of Ottoman society, soldiers and re'aya. Legal and political position of non-Muslims, timar system, economy, and taxation. Ottoman law, Shari'a and kanun, education and religion. Ottoman literature, political literature, art and architecture. Ottoman society in the period of social transformation, a'yans, the emergence of çiftlik, society during the period of Tanzimat reforms.</p> <p><i>Practice</i></p> <p>Introduction with Ottoman paleography and diplomacy, reading historical sources.</p>
