<b>Course Aims:</b> Theoretical acquisition of basic concepts of modern sociolinguistics. Recognizing and understanding functional-stylistic means and practicing their translation (German as both: the source language as well as the target language). The presentation of some sociolinguistic phenomena by means of examples from the German language and the German society aims at deepening the linguistic competence of the students and further expanding and nuancing their linguistic and cultural competence.		
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b> The students have theoretical and scientific knowledge in linguistics or sociolinguistics and are able to recognize and adequately translate functional-stylistic linguistic means.		
<b>Syllabus:</b> <i>Theory</i> The lectures familiarize students with basic concepts of modern sociolinguistics: linguistics - sociolinguistics - linguistic sociology, language and society, language and culture, language communities, acquisition of sociolinguistic norms; language variants: standard language, dialect, sociolect, language register, diglossia, bilingualism, coding, pidgin language, creole language, male or female language; language policy, minority language; speaking or using language as a social interaction: speech functions, speech norms, power and solidarity, forms of address, speech act theory, language styles and their characteristics. German as a pluricentric language. <i>Practice</i> As part of the exercises, various texts are read, analyzed functionally-stylistically and translated into Serbian or German.
