Course Aims:

Enablement of students for independent artistic and pedagogical work in the field of printmaking, using printmaking procedures and techniques of relief, intaglio, planographic or digital printing. The emphasis in the theoretical work is placed on traditional printmaking procedures and their application by historically significant artists. In practical work students are introduced to printmaking procedures and techniques that best correspond with their personal poetics. Completion of three prints in editions.

Learning Outcomes: Students acquire knowledge and experience in the application of assorted printmaking procedures and techniques and complete prints in accordance with personal creative sensibility and poetics. The student is capable of choosing the appropriate printmaking process and technique for completion of his/her own artistic ideas.

Syllabus:

Theory

One-on-one consultations on acquired knowledge and experience in the field of printmaking, with emphasis on traditional printmaking procedures and their application by historically significant artists. Discovery of personal creative sensibility through usage of literature. *Practice*

Completion (sketching, selection of sketches and techniques based on personal preferences, matrix production, proof printing, corrections, edition printing, presentation preparations) of 3 tasks.
